Most movies, books, tv shows, plays or any other fiction has the same basic structure,. First the characters and setting are established, then some sort of conflict enters the story. The stakes and details of that conflict are built up until it seems like things are at their most dire point. Then there is some sort of climax and resolution of the conflict. Finally the story wraps up following the resolution of the climax. Think of any story and its likely that you can think of how it followed that structure. As an example I'll use something that is beloved by most, the Peanut's Christmas special. The show starts of by establishing the basic characters of Charlie Brown, Snoopy, Lucy and the rest. Then it sets up the conflict, they have to put on a Christmas pageant and they have different ideas of how to do so. This continues to escalate throughout the show with pink trees, commercialism, musical numbers and so on, each making the production more of a spectacle and less of a Christmas pageant. The climax is resolved (in everyone's favorite scene) when Linus tells the Christmas story and reminds everyone what Christmas is all about. The spectacle fades away and they all join in singing, united by that Christmas message. Then the story quickly wraps up and the

credits roll. This sort of structure can be used to look at non-fiction events as well. Historical documentaries and books regularly use this structure to talk about everything from the Civil War to the Salem witch trials. Indeed we can even use this structure to help us understand the creation and salvation story. Perhaps the reason this story structure is so intrinsic to us is because it is God's story.

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth and of course people. It was Good, the order of God's world was perfect. Then Humans introduces the conflict, they introduced Sin. This conflict continued to ebb and flow through history. God would give the 10 commandments, he'd send profits, leaders, judges and Kings. God would forgive, and the people would again fall away from God's will. Each time the people drifted away from God things would get bad. They suffered civil war, they were conquered, they were occupies and eventually they'd be freed and the cycle would continue. God's people were simply unable to live without sin, and sin inevitably leads to destruction. It was at this time when things were their darkest, Rome having occupied Israel, that the climax occurs. Jesus, the son of God is born into this world. His teachings and life change those around him in deep and profound ways. He is eventually

captured, tried and executed only to rise three days later. In doing so he over comes the power of sin and death. No longer is our salvation based on what we can do but it is based on what Jesus already has done. That means that you and I are already saved by the Grace of God. In other words we are living in the epilogue of the story. Nothing we do can bring about the salvation that comes from God, because Jesus already has.

There is a freedom in that realization. Having been saved by God we are free to live our lives not as people who are looking to earn salvation but as people who are saved. We we working towards salvation they would always be in a way self centered, looking to earn our reward. But freed by God our actions can be truly selfless and thus more inline with God's will. We are free to care for others and love our neighbor for no reason other than its good, and right.

Each Advent we prepare to hear this story anew. To see with new eyes what God has done and what God continues to do. May we enter advent as people who are free to live as people who have been changed by the salvation story.

Mission Message

Mission Support

This is the season of pledge cards and annual budgets, so a review of Mission Support seems appropriate.

Through God's grace, we are freed in Christ to love and serve our neighbors. By sharing your God-given time, talents, and financial resources with your church, you are participating in God's work in your community and around the world.

YOUR CONGREGATION: when you make a financial gift to your congregation, the congregation's council stewards those funds to support the work of your congregation. In your annual budget, a portion of your offering is designated to be shared with the Upstate New York Synod. This is called Mission Support. If you do not see a line item in your congregation's budget called Mission Support, ask why not. YOUR SYNOD: All the congregations' Mission Support is stewarded by Bishop Macholz and the synod leaders to support the work of the synod. Things like nurturing congregations and rostered leaders, camps, colleges, seminaries. Synods designate a percentage of the Mission Support funds to be sent to the churchwide organization, usually 40-50%.

CHURCHWIDE: Mission Support dollars are used to respond to local and worldwide ministry opportunities, like new & renewing congregations, chaplaincy, advocacy, multicultural ministries, missionaries, hunger and disaster programs.
