First and for most I want to say that I'm excited. I cant wait to get to know all of you and to get to better know the ministries of St. John's. For years I have gotten to know St. John's as a neighbor as I've lived in the parsonage and you've perhaps best known me as the owner of the excitable dog next door. Now we get to know each other in a new way, as partners serving God and being the body of Christ together. St. John's has stood as a beacon for 175 years reaching out to the community and the world spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ. Now we embark on the next chapter of who God is calling us to be. It seems quite fitting that we begin this process of starting a new chapter in the history and ministry of St. John's at the same time that we finish our Lenten journey and move into the Easter season. This is a time in the Church year where we are compelled to look towards new chapters. There is simply no single moment that more clearly begins a new chapter than the resurrection of Christ. In the moment of the resurrection God's grace is made manifest. Once Children of a fallen humanity we are now saved by the grace of God. The world in that moment

becomes transformed by God's redeeming power. There are other new chapters turned in the resurrection as well. A new chapter where death is not the end of the story, a chapter where we are no longer in bondage to sin, a chapter where light truly breaks the darkness. I've been reflecting a lot about one more new chapter that begins in the resurrection, a new chapter for what it means to do ministry. Up until this point to be a follower of Jesus meant to literally follow him. Jesus led his disciples across the countryside of ancient Israel, teaching, healing and caring for those who they encountered. Jesus directly led them, taking them where they went, showing them what to do and teaching them all along the way. The resurrection was a new beginning, shortly in the Ascension Jesus would leave again and the disciples and followers of Jesus would have to follow him in a less literal way. God would still lead his people, through the teachings and examples of Christ and soon through the Holy Spirit. The disciples who once followed where Jesus led would take the Gospel and spread it to the four corners of the Earth. Beginning with the resurrection the ministry of the disciples transformed from learning from Jesus to a ministry of spreading what they had learned.

Our transition will of course not be quite that drastic. St. John's existed before any of us and will exist long after. The Holy Spirit does, however, compel us to explore where God is leading , to discern who God is calling us to be. This transition marks a new chapter in that discernment. I can't wait to get to learn about where St. John's has been , your strengths joys and desires for ministry. I see this as an opportunity for hope and enthusiasm, an opportunity to grow into our future together, guided by God. The Holy Spirit has brought you and I together and I eagerly await the opportunity to work with Council, committees and the whole congregation. To reiterate I am excited, and I pray you are too. I can't wait to get to know you better.

HOPE IN SOUTH SUDAN

South Sudan is the newest country in the world, created by the separation of Sudan into two countries. But it is also one of the most volatile countries in the world. 1.5 million South Sudanese are internally displaced and many more have fled to other countries due to poverty, food insecurity, a lack of education and health care, and extreme violence against civilians. The United Nations formally de-

clared that several regions of South Sudan are undergoing severe famine and more than 100,000 are reported to face imminent starvation.

The ELCA is responding to the disastrous humanitarian toll across the region through Lutheran Disaster Response. Also, the ELCA is beginning to establish an Evangelical Lutheran Church Africa Mission in South Sudan, breaking ground in 2016 for a Lutheran center and health clinic. The center will offer English language lessons and computer training, and the clinic will give much needed health care. Learn more at ELCA.org/globalministries.

Mawien Ariik and Wal Reat are South Sudanese who originally sought asylum in the US, and while here, became ELCA pastors. They have returned to South Sudan to coordinate and serve the new church. They are from rival tribes, but together they hope to grow the Lutheran church and bring healing to their country. Ariik says, "The message the church is conveying is that all tribes are children of God and we are supposed to remain as one." Hope is the common thread motivating them amid conflict, violence, and poverty towards a peaceful future.


